




Contra Costa County Office of Education Facts at a Glance



Court Schools Programs

The Contra Costa County Office of Education (CCCOE) provides full range educational services to students in the Contra Costa County Juvenile Detention Centers. We serve approximately 1000 students per year in two locations: **Mt. McKinley School**, located in John A. Davis Juvenile Hall in Martinez California and **Delta Vista School**, located in the Oran Allen Youth Center in Bryon. The program serves students who are detained while in various stages to the judicial process.


Our mission is to ensure academic improvement and successful transition, while promoting pro-social skills.



Instructional Program

Students are taught by credentialed staff and receive standards based academic coursework. Courses include:

- English Language Arts/English Language Development
- Construction Trades/Woodshop (Delta Vista)
- Reading Intervention
- Social Sciences
- Math
- Science
- Physical Education
- Computer Applications




Additionally, we offer a variety of CTE and A-G courses through an online program. We are currently involved with the Career Pathways Trust Grant, in partnership with Alameda County Office of Education, Contra Costa Community College, and Workforce Investment Board. We are building out pathways in Construction Trades, Hospitality and Tourism, and Information Technology.



Reentry is a critical focus for our program. We work with the districts to notify them of students being released from the facility to ensure a smooth transition back to the home school. We have assessment transition specialist as well as a reentry youth development specialist who work directly with students and community partners to help students transition to the next phase of life: back to the school district, to a community college, or to a work-based experience.

A full complement of special-education services are offered in an Instructional Support Program model. Identified students are served in their classrooms by special-education staff in a push-in model or are pulled out into a learning center.



Mt. McKinley and Delta Vista are accredited by the Western Association of Schools and Colleges (WASC).
